

FROM US 422:

Bartonella Bacteria Found in Hemangiosarcoma Tumors from Dogs

Researchers from North Carolina State University have found a very high prevalence of Bartonella bacteria in tumors and tissues – but not blood samples – taken from dogs with hemangiosarcoma, a cancer of the blood vessels. The work further supports the connection between persistent infection and some types of cancer and adds to the evidence that Bartonella can remain and thrive, undetected, within tissue.

Hemangiosarcoma (HSA) is an aggressive, deadly cancer that arises from cells lining the blood vessels. It is responsible for two-thirds of all heart or splenic tumors in dogs, and is most common in medium-sized and middle-aged dogs. Since HSA usually cannot be diagnosed without major abdominal surgery, most HSA remains undetected until it has reached an advanced stage, resulting in a one-year survival rate of only 12 to 20%.

“There are clear precedents for the involvement of bacterial infections in tumor development,” says Ed Breitschwerdt, Melanie S. Steele Distinguished Professor of Medicine at NC State’s College of Veterinary Medicine and corresponding author of a paper describing the work. “Given the established links between chronic inflammation and cancer, we wanted to determine whether chronic infection of blood vessels due to bacteria could be a contributing cause of this cancer.”

Breitschwerdt and colleagues from NC State looked at tumor tissue, non-tumor tissue and blood samples from 110 dogs with HSA from across the U.S. They screened both the tissues and the blood for Bartonella, Babesia, and Mycoplasma, three bacteria associated specifically with blood infections.

Bartonella DNA was amplified and sequenced from 80 of the dogs with HSA: it was present in 34% of tumor tissue and 63% of non-tumor tissue, but appeared in none of the blood samples. Mycoplasma DNA was only amplified from 5 of the dogs and Babesia wasn’t detected in any dog.

“Research in recent years has confirmed that persistent infection with or inflammation caused by stealth pathogens is a risk factor for developing cancer later in life,” Breitschwerdt says. “With the exception of Helicobacter pylori, the emphasis on evaluating the relationship between infection and cancer has focused on viruses. But intracellular bacterial pathogens such as Bartonella may also play an important and previously uninvestigated role.

“Bartonella is a stealth pathogen – it can ‘hide’ in the cells that line blood vessel walls, which is part of what makes it so difficult to detect,” Breitschwerdt says. “This work adds more evidence to the connection between infection and cancer risk, and demonstrates that molecular testing of whole blood samples does not rule out the tissue presence of this pathogen. Future studies are needed to investigate whether Bartonella infection can be a cause of HSA. Our team will be focusing on creating more sensitive diagnostic testing as part of this effort.”

The work appears in PLOS ONE and was supported by the American Kennel Club Canine Health Foundation (Grant 2550) and the Comparative Medicine and Translational Research Program of the National Institutes of Health (T32OD011130). Ph.D. student Erin Lashnits is first author.

Enjoying Watching a Lab Work

I had a wonderful time this past fall getting a WC on my Sammi (**DeSoleils's Sambuca Night**) out of Kathy Mines CH MH Jack Daniels. MJLRC put on a great event at an awesome venue and they even special ordered fabulous weather—a true trifecta! Several other Keystone club members also earned their WC that day!

As proud as I am of earning the title I would like to talk a little about the thrill of watching our labs do what they were bred to do. It is truly amazing how much of what they do is instinct and we just have to guide them and then get out of their way. Watching a young lab actually watch a older experienced lab do a land or water retrieve and then attempt it themself is such a thrill. I experienced first hand Sammi watching and learning from experienced handlers and labs at previous practices and then thrilling me and doing it herself.

I also belong to Waterland Retriever Club and have been working Sammi under the expert advice, help and training of Ann Hunter. Watching your lab swim out of sight behind an island trying to find a duck almost completely submerged, being given the signal by Ann to call her back, and then have her emerge from the far side of the island with the duck in her mouth to retrieve to hand is something I don't think will ever get old. Ann later told me she knew she was "on it" the minute she rounded the island and went straight to it in the water!

Ann is teaching me valuable lessons on breaking the various training activities down into important small steps that the dog will remember and patience is a really big part of the training. She constantly reminds me that undoing a mistake is so much harder than avoiding it in the first place with patience! Like breaking down a water/land/water retrieve into 2 separate retrieves so minimizing the chance of the dog coming out of the first pond and running around the second pond to get to you quicker! Or being really sure you have your dogs' attention when "marking " for a double retrieve.

Having faith and trust in your dogs' natural hunting and retrieving ability is also a key component of field work. Several weeks ago we were working on pheasants and this was the first time Sammi had ever even seen or smelled a pheasant.



Ann showed me how to acclimate her to the new scent and then we were off to a few field retrieves which she did right on mark. Then the real challenge, being steady at the line with a real gun being shot, then retrieving the fresh kill. Since Ann has been so thorough in breaking the various steps down, Sammi never hesitated in retrieving her pheasant. As exciting as that was what happened next was jaw dropping to me. Remember this is all

new territory to me, I have never worked a dog on live birds. The next pheasant shot was a runner and the previous dog would not retrieve it. Ann called me back to the line and said to send Sammi out. Her exact quote. "Let's see how much of her daddy she really has in her, you don't get an opportunity very often to go after a runner!" Sammi flew out, circled the pheasant twice, then grabbed it and brought it back still flapping. Thank goodness Ann handled it from there!!!

Whether you actively hunt your lab or just watch them instinctively do what they have been bred to do is very exciting! Hopefully I can learn enough and have enough patience to bring Sammi to the next level of actual hunt tests. Ann feels she has the natural talent, and without her actually saying it, I think she is telling me not to mess that up! Now, if I can only get her to jump off a dock for Dock Diving like she leaps into a pond.!!

A New AKC Judge!

The email came today. It's an important one for me. I was notified that I am now an American Kennel Club judge of Labrador Retrievers. It's been an ongoing process for the last two years.

I began showing Labradors in 1996. Since then, I've competed in conformation, field, obedience and rally. My dogs have earned well over 50 titles. I have also trained them in agility and tracking. It was a meaningful, enjoyable journey. Learning, making friends, and spending the time with the dogs is something I will always value.

Two and a half years ago, I decided to retire from competition with my dogs. My mind turned to judging the breed that is so close to my heart. I looked into the requirements to become a judge. I had most of them under my belt already. There were a couple of things that I needed to do in order to complete the judge application. I made the effort to get those things done and sent my application in by the end of May 2019.

I was apprehensive, as I had been told that very often the applicant is told that more needs to be accomplished in order to apply. When the email came telling me I could progress to the online tests, I was relieved. I took several tests about anatomy and judging procedures. I passed them with no problems.

The next step was two more tests: another anatomy and another procedural exam. The anatomy test was not an issue. The procedural test was.....awful. I failed it. I took it a second time and I failed it again! I read online that I was not alone. Many aspiring judges were struggling with it. I had never failed a test in my life. It was even open book. I had three chances to pass; only one incorrect answer was allowed. The third time was the charm. If I had failed that time, I would have had to wait six months to take it again.

The final step was the interview with the AKC field representative and the demonstration that I could properly use the wicket. The wicket is the equipment used for measuring dogs' height. Again, I heard horror stories about failing that procedure by bumping the dog, holding the wicket improperly, etc.

My interview was scheduled on my birthday. I drove up to Bloomsburg to the dog show at the fairgrounds. I met the field rep at the superintendent's desk. A good friend of mine works at the shows with the superintendent and she was there to cheer me on. I had to wait around for a while for the interview. It went smoothly. Then, I waited for the wicket test. A Golden Retriever was volunteered for the demonstration. The woman handling it could not have been nicer. She patiently listened to me as I stumbled through telling her about the formal procedure. Her dog stood like a rock, making it simple for me. Whew. It was over.

The results of my in person interview went to the AKC judges committee. When the email came today, I took a deep breath.
